Overview

What is Labor Market Information?

The Alabama Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) has the primary responsibility for providing Alabamians with labor market data through its Labor Market Information (LMI) Division. This division collects, assembles, analyzes, and drafts data into a usable format for the public. The LMI Division also provides training and technical assistance to familiarize customers with the data.

Labor Market Information (LMI) is data, which describes relationships between labor supply and demand using population, labor force, industry, occupation, projection, wage, and career data as well as general economic trends. These statistics are available for geographies such as the state, workforce development regions, metropolitan areas (MA), counties, select cities, and Workforce Innovation in Regional Economic Development (WIRED) areas.

LMI enables users to make well-informed career, planning and policy decisions. Our customers include economists, employers, analysts, career and guidance counselors, job seekers, educators, students, grant writers, and community planners. There are many frequent questions and they include the following. What jobs are in demand? What are the entry, mean and experienced wages for a particular job? How many workers in a specific area are employed and unemployed? What industries are projected to decline over the next 10 years?

Local Employment Dynamics

The *Local Employment Dynamics* (LED) program is a partnership between the Alabama Department of Industrial Relations, Labor Market Information Division and the US Census Bureau. This program provides *Quarterly Workforce Indicators* (QWI) *Online*, *Industry Focus*, and *On the Map* (Mapping) tools. These online tools use market indicators derived from state administrative records as well as censuses and surveys from the US Census Bureau. Some of these indicators are total employment and measures of change such as job flow, new hires, and separations, and average earnings.

Customers can access LED data from the Labor Market Information homepage under the **Workforce Development** link. Click on the **US Census Bureau, Local Employment Dynamics** pull-down menu to select the tool of your choice.

Consumer Price Index

Summary: The *Consumer Price Index* (CPI) is published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and it is a measure of the average change in prices over time of goods and services purchased by urban households. User fees (such as water and sewer service) and sales and excise taxes paid by the consumer are also included in this data. Income taxes and investment items (like stocks, bonds, and life insurance) are not included in the CPI. This data is available for all urban consumers (CPI-U) as well as urban wage earners and clerical workers (CPI-W). The chained CPI is available for all urban consumers (C-CPI-U).
